Missional Motives: Hands-on Mission By Pastor Jathaniel

Since April, I have used this space to reemphasize some very important parts of our identity as Colonial Park UMC. It's not unusual for any of us to gloss over what it is that makes us who we are as a congregation and fall into making assumptions about what is important to us as a church. One of the primary reasons for my use of this space over the previous four months is to keep before us very important hallmarks of our life as a congregation. Our Missional Motives not only are to characterize what we do as a church, but they are also an important piece of our mission principles as a church—remembering that our mission principles are an important part of how we define who we are as Colonial Park UMC and what our primary values are.

When we talk about mission, often we might be thinking of missions. *Missions* is typically referred to the service oriented, outward work of the church, *but* <u>mission</u> is a big part of how we understand God and ourselves. <u>God is a sending God: God the Father sent the Son, Father and Son sent the Spirit, and the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit sent the Church (from theologians J. Moltmann and D. Bosch). What does that have to do with *our* church? *The church in our most basic nature is a body that is sent to participate in what God is doing in our world.* We are the laborers in His harvest. As the church we are sent out and called back in to gather. So, gathering as a church is an important part because that is where we are encouraged, equipped, and inspired to go back out into the world continuing our work of Kingdom collaboration.</u>

Our final Missional Motivation is Hands-on Mission. <u>Every disciple of Jesus is commissioned and sent</u>. There is not minimal standard or prerequisite or certification that is needed. Being a disciple is giving yourself to be formed in the character and competency of Jesus—learning to be the kind of person Jesus is and doing the kind of things Jesus did. While we might learn a little bit of information, true and deep learning requires us to turn outwardly and try it/do it. While disciples may be equipped to some degree in a worship service, class, group, or study, disciples are ultimately formed through learning that happens by applying that information in service to others-especially people outside the church (recall the three dimensions of Jesus' life up, in, and out).

So, our Missional Motive of Hands-on Mission speaks to this. It's a part of our outreach, but it also a huge part of our formation as disciples of Jesus. We demonstrate Hands-on Mission by holding on to the understanding that life change is experiential. This means that while information is important, we are ultimately impacted and formed by our experiences—where we personally engage in living out Jesus' ways among other people. This also means that we value being sent out to get our hands dirty for Christ's sake. Getting our hands dirty is about firsthand engagement in the life of others. That can be physical service or even intentional, personal investment in the life of people far for Christ. Finally, we also understand that Hands-on Mission is really about understanding that Jesus Christ is already at work in our community in ways that we may not readily see, but as we go about our life we want to be open and engaged fully where we see Jesus at work already—you can join with someone else with something that is already happening or Jesus may be presenting you a unique opportunity to be his hands and feet.

All five of our Missional Motivations are vitally important hallmarks for our congregation and our personal discipleship of Jesus. I pray and hope that you continue to lean into this life of following Jesus—continuing to grow in the likeness of Jesus as you learn from Jesus as his apprentice.

I watched an entire community of folks make a huge impact on the lives of so many. What I witnessed wasn't easy for most of the folks. Dads and husbands leaving work and heading to the fields to work or practice a team. Moms and neighbors would be rounding up kids and getting them to the practice or the game. The stands were filled at the three parks with enthusiastic fans four nights a week. I saw people laughing, working, crying and loving together for a common goal. I saw how a community of folks could and did make such an impact. You know, after the Man with the Vision passed away the only thing that changed was the main park was named after him. The program never missed a beat as it was The Community that was ALL IN that made it a continuing success. I learned that nothing is too BIG if we ALL join for a common cause.

Our goal is to engage, equip and empower our congregation and community to be missional disciples. To go BEYOND to lead people of a hurting world into a new life through Jesus Christ.

They will know we are his by our LOVE.

I only know one way to be IN and that is to be ALL IN. Are you?

Discipleship churches assess passions and challenge one another to live into our God given gifts to make volunteers roles more meaningful for those involved.

Membership churches have participants who ask, "how did worship lift me up today?" or "what programs are being done for me?"

Discipleship churches have participants who ask, "what are the vehicles in which I can celebrate and grow in God?" or "how can I be equipped and empowered to love my neighbor as God commanded?"

Membership churches rely primary on the pastor to lead and guide ministry efforts.

Discipleship churches rely on one another as a family of believers who want to use Colonial Park as a platform with which to share the love and life of Jesus with others.

Membership churches focus on those who already know Jesus.

Discipleship churches yearn to connect unbelievers with Jesus through love and action.

As a discipleship church, we want you to serve and be involved in areas in which God calls you - ministry areas that present opportunities for you to experience God and refuel. That doesn't mean it'll be easy – there may be a healthy challenge involved – but God has given you passions and interests for a reason.
