One of the things that I am most proud of is the fact that I have had the opportunity to be your pastor. I am so glad that God brought me to you. I am grateful for the vision of healthy and fruitful ministry that God has given us and that we work to fulfill. That work will continue because it doesn't just stop with one person. Over the last four years, we have worked to live into a different way of organizing ourselves for faithful mission. Some call it a "One Board" structure, but is only ¼ of the whole. We organized to into a simplified accountability structure that I believe will be helpful not only in a time such as this where we are transitioning pastoral leadership, but it organizes us in a way that makes it a little simpler to be faithful to Jesus in our work. Here is the structure for accountability in a nutshell (I will go from left to right to save space):

Jesus > Church Board > Pastor > Staff > Congregation

Jesus is the head of His Church. The board and its members are the stewards if the mission, vision, direction, and governance of our church. The pastor is accountable to the board, but he/she is responsible for leadership to support the mission, vision, and direction of the church. The staff serve to equip the congregation for ministry. The congregation is responsible for doing the ministry of the church.

Why does this matter? It matters because what I want you to understand is that in this time of transition, the mission, vision, and direction of our congregation does not change (at least not until Jesus leads the board to change that). The primary change will be that there will be a new leader who will bring wonderful gifts to use in leading our congregation in faithful mission and ministry. And God will continue to see the new work that He began in you through to completion. You all continue to be in prayers as you prepare for the next leg of your missional journey, and I hope that you will continue to keep me and my family in yours.

OUTREACH MINISTRIES WAKE UP, SLEEPER

The Big Picture is not easy to see as we focus on ourselves or on an event in which we are participating. I think that's where I get lost when I don't realize God has a Plan that includes me, but not solely about me. Not to say that my part of the plan isn't important, however it's more important to the Big Picture than when it stands alone.

It's kind of like when Tennessee plays Arkansas in basketball. Well, we know Arkansas is going to win, but that's for another article. Let's say Arkansas is leading in the 2nd half by 15 points and Arkansas's coach starts substituting players. The fans really want to beat Tennessee by 30 points so they are focused on winning the game by as much as they can and not on the need for players to get experience that will help the team as the season progresses. Winning the game by a large margin is not nearly as important as just winning the game and getting other players experience, they will need further down the road.

We all have a part to play in the Big Picture that sometimes we just don't see. OK let's say for instance we can't help with the Room in The Inn on Monday nights. First of all, I wish we could lose the words can't, won't, couldn't, shouldn't etc. Anyway, back to Monday nights and we have something else scheduled, or we don't get out after dark or those folks make us uncomfortable or so forth and so on.

Let's step back and look at the Big Picture. What if by teaching Sunday School or working with the youth we influence the lives of these young folks by showing them God's Love and an example of Serving. These same young folks help cook meals that we supply to the RITI or to our U-Can Ministry. Also, these same youngsters help put together Manna Bags for the less fortunate. Haven't we actually contributed to these Outreach Ministries by doing our part? I would say Heck Yes!!

I challenge you to find your Part of the Big Picture. If you need help, then ask what can I do to be the Hands and Feet of Jesus. Don't sit in the back and wait on someone to call on you. Actually, you have been Called already. It's time to Shake UP that 80%---20% rule. Wake Up Sleeper.

DISCIPLESHIP MINISTRY

As a member of Colonial Park and as a member of the staff team, I've so appreciated the Colonial Park UMC Board's hard work in prayerfully discerning and prioritizing our strategic goals for the next 3-5 years. Not only have they spent a considerable amount of time streamlining our focus as a church, but their work is instrumental in how I lead and equip disciples.

Vision Bites, that have been presented in worship and in our e-newsletter, are helpful in breaking down the strategic goals and why they are important. The Discipleship Ministry Leadership Team (DMLT) has been living into the goals and objectives that equip us as disciples of Jesus. We've seen the fruit of our work in Launch Point Lunches that introduce new guests to Colonial Park and launch them on their discipleship journey. We've seen people engage and go deeper in their discipleship through Equipping Nights that are held once a month. It is a journey, after all – a life-long one. As a team, we use the goals and objectives to guide us in our kingdom work.

As an individual, I had the privilege on Sunday at our Easter Festival to witness God affirming Colonial Park's faithful efforts. I saw our Vision Bites lining up with the world outside our door. I worked one of the craft tables and it was a joy to engage with our neighbors. I met Brooklyn who attends Sea Isle Elementary and used to hate math but now loves it. Our table sang "Happy Birthday" to Addie who was turning 8 and thought the festival was the best part of her birthday. We made bunny bracelets with a family who lives in the neighborhood on Murff and homeschools their children. I met "Little James" who had a wild head of curls and was a spitting image of his kind father. All this to say, I see hope and opportunity blooming in our strategic objectives as a church and I saw that come to life on Sunday – an intentional focus on our neighbors, connections with our neighborhood school, engaging Christ-like love activities and relationship-building opportunities, and FUN!

If you have grown to be more like Jesus in prayer or community or service, if you had a blast seeing energy and life at the Easter Festival, if you feel as though God is moving and shaking in your life – ask yourself, "how might he use me to share that joy and life with others?"

I invite you to be in prayer as Colonial Park lives into our strategic objectives – as a church, as teams, as individuals. I challenge you to pray for guidance how God might use you to live into the objectives and make new disciples for the transformation of the world.
